### **Birds and Butterflies**

The monarch's made their migration through our area the middle of September. We had many monarch's this year compared to last year but we've also had a lot of milkweed, their host plant, to help with their migration. Thanks to everyone that's taken it upon themselves to plant milkweed native to your area to help with spring and fall migration, we can make changes so monarch's will never become extinct in our lifetime. If you need common milkweed seed for spring planting, send me a note, as long as I have some, I'll share.

It's in the news this week that 23 species of birds, butterflies, mammals, and plants have been added to the Extinction List, a sad moment for many of us.

I've taken down my hummingbird feeders but the hummingbirds are still around the flowers. When I take the feeders down in the fall I make sure they're clean and ready for spring. I feed sunflower seeds in the fall and winter months, to the birds. We have guite a variety of birds at our home.

One special bird that seems to stay here is a cardinal. Special messengers from Heaven I'm told. He's here daily, one day he landed on the porch railing yelling, yelling, so Peewee and I went out to see the problem. A stray cat was attacking birds at the front feeder. Peewee chased the stray cat off, saving the birds at the feeder. Stray cats are a number one killer of backyard birds, if you live in the country cats are great mousers on the farm, but in town, they're killers of our birds.

I purchase sunflower seeds by the 50 pound bags, two bags a month. They attract a variety of birds, nuthatches, chickadees, cardinals, finches, and numerous sparrows. We also take part in the winter bird count. Depending on where you live, you can participate in the winter bird count. Two bird counts, one is the Audubon's 122nd Christmas Bird Count that will take place between December 14, 2021 to January 5, 2022. The Great Backyard Bird Count will take place between February 18, 2022 and February 21, 2022. Make plans to participate in one of these great Bird Counts; it's a great way to spend the day viewing our feathered friends.

Plans are being made to hold a Bald Eagle Day in Sioux Rapids, Iowa on Saturday, April 16, 2022. This will be the 12th Bald Eagle Day, where we've released a raptor back into the wild. Anyone wishing to participate is welcome to send me an email requesting more information. Enjoy our Wild Birds.

### **Blue and Gold Memorial Markers**

It has been 75 years since the Blue Star Memorial Program was adopted as a National Council project at the Annual Meeting in New Orleans in 1946. A Blue Star Memorial Highway system was outlined, consisting of one east-west and seven north-south routes (today there are many more). The east-west route was US 40 and ran through Indiana, Illinois, and Missouri in the Central Region of NGC. The program and first markers were "A Tribute to the Nation's Armed Forces who served in World War II." In 1951 the program was changed to include all men and women who had served, were serving, or would serve in the armed forces of our nation.

Illinois placed twin markers in April 1946, both on US Route 40, one near the Illinois-Indiana state line and the other near the Illinois-Missouri line. Both of these markers were repainted in 1997 and relocated to new interstate highway rest areas on I-70 which runs along US 40. Chris Seal, The Garden Club of Indiana, Inc. Blue Star Memorial Chairman said that The Garden Club of Indiana. Inc's first Blue Star Memorial was placed in 1950, so this would have also been one of the World War II style markers. It was located in Richmond, Indiana and Route 40 goes through there and would have been close to the Indiana-Ohio line. The marker was lost from storage and no one knows where it is. Chris says that she has been contacted by the Garden Club of Richmond and that they will be working on getting a Blue Star back in Richmond where it all began in Indiana.

More news from Indiana: Broad Ripple Garden Club is dedicating a Gold Star Families Memorial By-Way Marker at the Gazebo at City Hall in Carmel, Indiana on Nov. 8, 2021 at 10:30 a.m. This will be the first dedication of a Gold Star in the state of Indiana. Another Gold Star dedication will be held later this year in Hammond, Indiana.

Michigan is having a busy year. The Saline Stone and Thistle Garden Club dedicated a Gold Star Marker on September 18, and Mason Sycamore Creek Garden Club dedicated a Gold Star Marker on September 26. Upcoming dedications will be: Nov. 13 – Kent Garden Club, both Blue and Gold Star Markers; and Nov. 18: Petal Pushers Garden Club will dedicate a Gold Star Marker.

The Garden Clubs of Illinois, Inc. postponed a rededication of an older marker until next spring. The Algonquin and the Wilmington garden clubs are having their markers repainted. Wilmington Garden Club will rededicate their marker on November 13. The Wilmington marker is located at the VFW post downtown Wilmington on Historic Route 66. It is the 95<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Route 66 and members of the Route 66 organization will participate in the ceremony as well as VFW and garden club members.

The Federated Garden Clubs of Minnesota, Inc. dedicated a Blue Star Memorial Marker at the Soldiers Cemetery on the Leech Lake Tribal Nation of the Ojibwa on June 25.

### **Invasive Plants Seed Viability**

About twelve years ago I purchased a bag of soil that apparently had not been heat treated. Ever since that time I have been plagued with butterweed! Although it is considered a native plant to North America, it spreads aggressively. Wherever I placed soil from that bag, I had butterweed growing - not just a couple of plants, but hundreds! Without herbicide, the butterweed kept coming back. Despite persistent removal of the sprouts prior to going to seed, new plants are still appearing today.

This motivated me to look into seed viability of some of the invasive plants in our area, which can be insightful as to why it is so difficult to eradicate invasive plants. The seeds of curly dock, for example, can outlast many of us gardeners! Thankfully most of these invasive seeds only remain viable 2-10 years.

- Hellebores—this evergreen perennial plant thrives and blooms through winter. Often referred to as the 'Christmas rose'.
- Red Twig Dogwood—a staple for any winter landscape with snow. The red makes a stand out statement against the snowy white.
